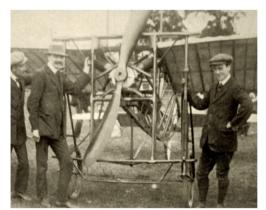
GORDON ARMSTRONG - BEVERLEY'S WOULD BE AVIATOR

In 1907 Gordon Armstrong converted the former Tiger Inn at Lairgate, Beverley into a garage with the intention of using the premises for the small scale manufacture of cars and aeroplanes. He was respected in the town as an engineer and inventor and in the late 1920's he designed and manufactured the Armstrong Shock Absorber. He had been inspired by Bleriot's Channel flight in 1909 and on a visit to London in 1910 he bought himself an aeroplane which was built mainly of Bleriot parts. He assembled the machine in his newly acquired garage and named the aeroplane "Armstrong No 1" which was painted on the rudder. It somewhat resembled a Bleriot XI, wingspan was 35ft, it was 20ft long, and was powered by a 35hp Anzani fan type engine.

Armstrong was given permission to test his machine on an area of fields called Beverley Westwood just to the west of the town and close to the racecourse. On two occasions he wheeled his aeroplane to these fields from his workshop, to test whether it would fly. He had two attempts at flight on the evening of 26th August 1910 and on the second run that day he managed to raise the monoplane but only by a few feet. The event was witnessed by a large crowd of local citizens and a local reporter was present to record the event. Strong winds had prevented him flying any distance though there were exaggerated reports that it had been kept aloft for around an hour. On landing the tailwheel was "smashed off". The aeroplane was wheeled back to the workshop in Tiger Lane where it was quickly repaired and the damaged tailwheel was replaced by a skid.

On the evening of September 1st 1910 at precisely 5pm the Armstrong No1 was again wheeled to Beverley Westwood for an attempt at a second flight. This had been well publicised around the town in advance and again a large crowd gathered with great excitement to watch. Conditions could not have been better, it was calm with a clear sky. Unfortunately the owner/pilot injured his hand on the propeller just before he was to climb into the cockpit and this caused a small delay. Armstrong finally climbed into his seat amidst considerable applause and he "pulled the lever and let his aircraft go". When the aeroplane was released it set off along the ground for some distance followed by a crowd of around 100 spectators. When Armstrong was at the end of this first run he turned round to head back in the opposite direction but he was then faced with hundreds of people directly in his path. He managed to turn round to face the opposite direction away from the crowds but in doing so a front wheel buckled. There is no report of Armstrong becoming airborne that day. The aeroplane was pushed back to the Tiger Lane garage where it would be repaired and modified in good time to be ready for a further attempt at flight.





The circle to the left are the fields of Beverley Westwood with Armstrong's garage premises shown to the right of the picture. The picture to the right shows the workshop circled on the left with the less favourable Swinemoor circled to the right. It was a fair distance for Armstrong to push his aeroplane from his garage to Swinemoor.

On 10th September 1910 there was a report in the Beverley Independent that the Beverley Pasture Masters, who oversaw most of the fields around the town, had decided that in future all aviators should be restricted to the fields at Swinemoor Pasture, to the east of the town. The new site was put to use on 16th September when Armstrong off set at 6am from his Tiger Lane workshop pushing his monoplane. The operation extended into the evening and the large crowds, which once again gathered to watch, hampered the young aviator considerably. Also the ground was far too rough to permit a good speed to be attained for take off. Armstrong was having problems with the engine so had to restrict himself to taxying his monoplane along the ground.

He was still confident that given a clear run and suitable ground, which to date had not been possible, his efforts would achieve success. However, there were no further reports of Armstrong attempting flight after 16th September 1910 and eventually the Monoplane was advertised for sale, complete with engine, in 1912. There are no records on the fate of the airframe but the engine, a 35hp Anzani, stood for many years until the 1950's in a corner of the car showroom of Armstrong's Garage in North Bar Within, Beverley. Armstrong himself continued to concentrate on car and motor cycle manufacturing and repair business and he would achieve success in hill climbing competitions.

Visit to Elvington....

On Wednesday 10 April. 17 members arrived at Elvington for a visit to the Museum. We were met at reception by Patricia Room who is the Front of House Supervisor and is the person who I have arranged all the details of our group visit. I duly paid the entrance fee for all the group and we were then taken into the Chapel building for a short talk on of RAF Elvington past and present .We were then introduced to Gary Hancock who is the Aircraft Conservation Manager. He then gave us a guided tour behind the scenes of the work being done to various aircraft to return them to a good condition suitable for viewing. In the Engineering hangar we were able to witness and learn about the restoration of a SEPCAT Jaguar Hawker XZ383, Hurricane, Jet Provost (ex Linton on Ouse) and a SE-5 1st World war fighter. This is a very crowded Hangar with very little available space, hence the future plan to build 2- more new large hangars to accommodate more Aircraft engineering and Museum space.



After this tour we were able to view all the Aircraft both inside and outside on the hard standings at our leisure and take as many photos as required. Later we all gathered for lunch in the temporary building as the Canteen was currently closed due to repair work on its roof. Sandwiches and cake and hot/cold drinks were available.

At 1.00 pm we had arranged a private visit to view XV250 the HS Nimrod MR2. We were introduced to Mick Whittaker who is the senior Engineer and his team. They are responsible for keeping this amazing Aircraft in tip top condition and the engines fully operable. We were shown around the Aircraft both externally. This Aircraft was nick named "Maid of Moray" and was based at RAF Kinloss and was delivered to Elvington in April-2010 Its primary role was as a Cold War Submarine hunter /killer and equipped with Sonar equipment for detection, and Torpedoes and Missiles for attack/defence. It operated with a crew of 12 personnel -2- pilots, 1-flight engineer, 2- navigators, 1- air electronics officer, 2-weapons system operator's, and 4- electronic warfare operators. This was to be a fascinating visit to a quite amazing Aircraft and was much applauded by all our members.

Whats going on with our airfields?

Lets get close to home to start with as In Rufforth,

The existing McLean Aviation business premises are up for sale

However, the original planning agreement to build the house includes a restriction limiting its occupation to someone solely or mainly employed in the business on site. The dwelling must remain in the same ownership as the office workshop/store and hangar. The current business is not for sale.

Rufforth Airfield is effectively divided in two. Rufforth West comprises runway 17/35 and the airfield west of this runway. It's operated by York Gliding Centre. Resident aircraft include a number of touring motor gliders and tug aircraft, as well as gliders.

Rufforth East is home to a gyrocopter school and a variety of privately owned aircraft including gyrocopters, three-axis and weight-shift microlights and other light aircraft.

Now for Tollerton

A new planning application has been submitted for homes to be built at Nottingham City Airport in Tollerton. Developers, Vistry Homes applied to start the planning process last year, with the company at the time revealing an ambition to demolish the cafe and air traffic building at the airport, remove the runway and build up to 1600 houses.

Rushcliffe Borough Council has confirmed an application for the "first phase" of a residential development on the site has now been submitted. The plan seeks approval for 400 houses, with access from Tollerton Lane.

It seems that the owner has already sold the site and instead has bought the nearby Langar airfield with the objective of developing that for GA uses.

And **Popham**

Popham Airfield is under threat of being turned into a garden village with 3,000 homes being built on the Hampshire site.

The Airfield is included in the latest update to the local plan for Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council which is expected to be released for a six-week consultation period later this month.

The document describes Popham Garden Village as "a healthy and sustainable place with a strong, clearly defined and coherent village character, which maximises the opportunities presented by its attractive rural setting in a sensitive and positive manner".

There's no mention of Popham Airfield or aviation activities.

It appears a developer has already been approached, although the project is renamed Coxford Garden Village.

On the Alfred Strategic website, it says, "Alfred Homes has been chosen to act as promoter of the future Coxford Garden Village, located within Basingstoke & Deane Borough. The emerging masterplan for the new village includes a range of services, schools and a local centre to support a thriving and highly sustainable new community within Hampshire."

In a general round up of airport news from around the UK, FTN takes a look at some of those airfields currently under threat and some which are living the high life. With apologies to those airfields that have been inadvertently left out from this report, here's the current UK airfield scene as FTN perceives it.

First on the threat list is Old Sarum airfield in Wiltshire, which has been very quiet for the last few years after the owners booted out all aircraft operators in 2019 except the skydiving company and associated flying school. The latest news from Old Sarum is that the owners have recently entered a new planning application with the local council to build up to 315 houses on the historic site.

The planning application, which is currently in the consultation phase, also includes provision for continued aviation activity, stating that in addition to the 315 new homes, the site will also be used for a "mixture of employment, commercial – leisure, and aviation uses, including a 'flying hub' compromising control tower, heritage centre, visitor centre, café – restaurant, parachute centre, aviation archives and aircraft hangars."

There's a fair amount of scepticism over what actual aviation activity would be permitted to continue under this new proposal however, given the history surrounding the previous planning application.

When the previous planning application to build houses on Old Sarum airfield was rejected by Wiltshire Council, it was noted that the owner's fall back position was that even if planning permission wasn't granted, flying could continue at Old Sarum.

However, just two weeks after the decision, aircraft owners were given notice to quit. The only aviation activity that was permitted to continue was the skydiving operation and associated flying school, and allegedly only then because the company had an unbreakable contract to continue operating at the airfield.

The timing of this latest planning application is interesting in that it is understood that Wiltshire Council are in the process of removing a policy which currently allows redevelopment at the airfield, having now decided that the site holds historic importance and shouldn't be turned into a housing estate.

Also on the threat list is Coventry Airport, home to four flying schools. The 'gigafactory' proposal – a plan to turn the airport into a factory producing batteries for electric cars – has been ongoing for three years since the airport operators, the Rigby Group, in a joint venture with Coventry City Council, proposed the idea in February 2021.

While planning permission was granted last year, all has been quiet since then with no one apparently interested in investing in the gigafactory – including its nearest neighbour Jaguar Land Rover – but recently Coventry City Cllr Jim O'Boyle told the press that they were in "advanced discussions with leading Asian battery manufacturers who want to develop a presence in the UK" and that any such deal would be warmly welcomed by government, who would roll out the red carpet for an investor, providing them with an "unprecedented regional incentives package" to help secure the deal.

Not so much under threat this time, but rather apparently in somewhat of a shambolic state judging by comments from the airport's residents, is Swansea Airport, home to Cambrian Flying Club

Back in January, FTN reported that Swansea Council had agreed to negotiate a new lease with the existing leaseholder, but after continued complaints from residents over how the airport was being run and maintained, and the subsequent suspension of the airport's operating licence towards the end of January by the CAA due to a "systematic failure of safety management", the Council instead commissioned a report to see what options were available to improve the situation.

Some seven months later and at the end of September, Swansea Council finally reached their decision, deciding to part ways with the current leaseholder, stating that it intended to go to court to take possession of the airport. While the legal process runs its course (and it's not predicted to be quick) the council said it would continue to explore a range of options for a viable airport future. It said its aim was to achieve a seamless transition of the occupancy and operational arrangements should the legal action to retake possession be successful. One final airfield potentially under threat is Thruxton Aerodrome. While there has been no official news yet, it's understood that property management company Xlb Property has been tasked to undertake an 'asset management programme' of the Hampshire airfield and racetrack. While no mention of sale for redevelopment has been mooted, Xlb do mention on their website that one of its objectives with Thruxton is to "promote strategic land through the planning process" which FTN understands could be developer speak for redevelopment on the airfield. There have been rumours of the airfield being redeveloped into warehousing for the likes of Amazon, but so far nothing concrete (excuse the pun) has emerged.

On the brighter side of this airfield round-up are Barton, Blackpool, Gloucestershire, Kemble, Oxford and Sherburn.

Barton Aerodrome in Greater Manchester recently became the first airfield in the UK to gain approval from the CAA for a new low-cost safety system providing real-time information to air traffic staff, working in the UK's oldest operational control tower.

The system, known as a Flight Information Display (FID), looks similar in appearance to a radar screen used at large airports, but uses a low-cost receiver aerial, from avionics manufacturer uAvionix, mounted on the control tower roof to receive data transmitted from aircraft providing their position twice a second using a system called Automatic Dependent Surveillance – Broadcast (ADS-B).

This data is then plotted on a map of the airspace around the airfield allowing the air traffic team to have increased situational awareness and to be able to warn pilots of other aircraft and airspace.

The project has taken six years to complete and is the brainchild of aviation consultant Steve Hutt who operated under the governance of Airspace4All funded by the CAA's Future Airspace Strategy Facilitation Fund. Key to the project was the development of a new CAA policy permitting the use of FIDs by Air Traffic Units. Blackpool Airport has recently unveiled new plans for five new hangars, claimed to be the first new major developments at the airport in more than 15 years.

As part of the Blackpool Airport Enterprise Zone, outline planning consent is being sought for three 20,000 sq. ft hangars suitable for general aviation aircraft, as well as two hangars for MRO activities on commercial aircraft.

Commenting on the proposals, Cllr Gillian Campbell, chair of the board at Blackpool Airport Operations, said: "This is a major step forward for our historic airport. For over 100 years Blackpool Airport has been a huge part of our local area and economy. It is a mammoth task to redevelop it while also keeping it open for our customers, but we will make it work.

"Our general aviation community is vitally important, along with our flight training operators, and these new hangars will create purpose-built facilities for them close to the runway. We can then explore further potential developments over the coming years.

Gloucestershire Airport has also announced development plans recently, confirming that it is joining the Project Heart initiative to create, store and distribute green hydrogen. Project Heart is a collaboration between Protium, a green hydrogen energy services company, Haskel, who manufacture hydrogen compression systems and Nel Hydrogen, a hydrogen generation and distribution specialist.

The new airport-based facility is expected to start producing hydrogen next summer and will initially be providing fuel to R&D projects such as ZeroAvia's hydrogen-electric aircraft development project over at nearby Kemble Airfield in the Cotswolds, which is gearing up to receive a hydrogen 'refuelling solution' for ZeroAvia's R&D project.

Oxford Airport has made it to this list following approval for its recently approved R&D Science Park. Comprising a 200,000+ sq. ft development at the airport, it will include up to seventeen units (ranging from 7,700 sq. ft to 56,300 sq. ft) marketed primarily for "start-ups and spin-outs from the University science ecosystem," these "laboratory enabled, Grade-A accommodation facilities" will nonetheless be open to any business, with airport business development manager James Dillon-Godfrey expressing a personal interest in attracting aviation technology companies.

In other developments at the airport, the owners are also investing heavily in additional infrastructure including a major new hangar complex, seven new helipads and the provision for additional electric charging solutions. A new fuel tender will also see SAF available from the airport as early as next year.

Sherburn Airfield, home to Sherburn Aero Club, is the final airfield on this brief list, here by virtue of having been granted approval by the CAA a couple of months ago to operate GNSS Instrument Approach Procedures (IAPs) to two runways.

The CAA has granted approval for GNSS approaches to runways 10 and 28 at the Yorkshire airfield, which are now up and running. No new volumes of controlled airspace have been introduced as the procedures are flown in open Class G airspace.

The only change imposed is a slot allocation system to ensure there's no possibility of aircraft being booked into Sherburn and neighbouring Leeds East Aerodrome concurrently.

Jet2 "new to them" Boeing 737-800's continue to appear at LBA

AIRPORT NEWS

Dubai have revealed massive plans for the world's busiest airport. It will be an expansion of Al Maktoum International airport, which opened 14 years ago. It was always envisaged for this brand new airport some 20 miles southwest of Dubai to become the biggest passenger-handler in the world. However, now the plan is for the megahub to eventually accommodate 260 million passengers per year. That's a 100 million passengers more than previous projections for the airport and would dwarf pretty much every other airport's operations on the planet. "It will be five times the size of the current Dubai International Airport, and all operations at Dubai International Airport will be transferred to it in the coming years," Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, the ruler of Dubai, said when outlining Dubai Aviation Engineering Projects' strategic plan. "The airport will accommodate 400 aircraft gates and feature five parallel runways," he added. When completed, it'll cover 70 square kilometers (27 square miles). The airport will be the centrepiece of a much larger scheme, called Dubai South, that envisages the creation of a whole new city in a 145-square-kilometer (56-square-mile) stretch of desert just south of Dubai. This entire new district, of which some pieces are already starting to take shape, will have eight districts each allocated to a specific industry or activity, with a mix of residential and commercial areas as well. "As we build an entire city around the airport in Dubai South, demand for housing for a million people will follow. It will host the world's leading companies in the logistics and air transport sectors," said Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Mattoon. "We are building a new project for future generations, ensuring continuous and stable development for our children and their children in turn. Dubai will be the world's airport, its port. its urban hub, and its new global centre."

Gatwick expansion inquiry has begun. The inquiry, by the Planning Inspectorate, into the DCO concerning Gatwick Airport's plan to use its emergency runway for routine flights started with an open session, and many people – both in favour of the plan, and against, allowed a brief time to speak. All those in favour were businesses, or business groups – or people in some way linked to the airport, and hoping its expansion would be good for their business in the short to medium term, and perhaps provide more good jobs. Those against were local councils and local residents who – with passion – put forward the range of negative impacts that the

expansion would bring. Those would include the climate impacts of thousands more tonnes of CO2 per year; surface transport impacts; air pollution; noise pollution, especially at night; and social impacts of the pressure on local infrastructure, from many more workers at the airport, and many more air passengers. The inquiry is being held in Crawley, and is due to last six months

Southend Airport is set to be easyJet's 10th U.K. base, next March. With three A320neo aircraft based at the airport, the expansion will create around 130 direct jobs and support additional indirect employment opportunities. The move underscores easyJet's strategy to capitalise on key growth opportunities, fuelled by strong consumer demand for flights and holidays. The airline's investment in London Southend strengthens its network, offering more routes and package holiday options to travellers in the region. Johan Lundgren, CEO of easyJet, highlights the significance of the UK market and the airline's trusted brand, while John Upton, CEO of London Southend Airport, emphasises the convenience and connectivity the new base will provide for passengers.

Tees-side Airport could see 49% of its ownership sold British billionaire Michael Flacks. Mr Flacks, who is CEO of US-based investment firm Flacks Group which specialises in buying distressed companies, told the Financial Times he was in talks with Tees Valley Combined Authority (TVCA) to buy a minority share in the regional airport. The authority bought the struggling airport in 2019 for £40m and has provided funding and loans to keep it open and increase passenger numbers. "They've been losing money for years," he told the FT. "The way to make it profitable is do differently to what they're doing. "Mr Flacks appeared on the Sunday Times Rich List as the 141st richest person in the UK, with a personal wealth of £1.213bn. The airport has been politically valuable to Conservative mayor Ben Houchen, who led its purchase by TVCA. He pledged passenger flights to Tenerife and Malaga would take off from the airport if re-elected this month, despite TVCA having confirmed that he has "no operational role" at the airport.

Despite retaining a majority shareholding, TVCA would be a "silent partner" in the venture according to Mr Flacks. He has said his plan for the airport is to turn it into a cargo, repair and maintenance hub in a move away from passenger services. "It's not that they're not doing a good job, but running a passenger airport is a hopeless exercise," he said. In a statement, Lord Houchen said: "Over recent months we have had expressions of interest from a number of firms wanting to invest in our airport and take a share in the ownership. "This is a massive vote of confidence and officers have done the diligent thing in assessing these proposals. "I have always been clear that the public should own Teesside Airport. That is the mandate I have and that is how things should remain. "So while it shows our ten-year plan is working, and private investors can see great value in the airport, it is not for sale and will remain in public ownership. "Our plan is working and our airport is staying as it is."

AIRLINE NEWS

Ascend Airways has embarked on commercial services, having flown a charter operation from London Southend. The carrier obtained its air operator's certificate and scheduled route licence from the UK Civil Aviation Authority on 9 April. Ascend states that it carried out its first service on 26 April, on behalf of Chapman Freeborn. Both companies are part of Avian Solutions Group. The carrier operated the service with a Boeing 737-800, G-HODL. Its 737-800 is a 2011 airframe, and the carrier says it has also acquired a 2022 737 Max 8. The airline has a new contract for the summer season operating flights for TUI Airways in the UK with the two Boeings' 737. The two jets will be based at London Gatwick for the summer and fly off to various key European and North African holiday destinations for the holiday giant TUI. Alistair Wilson, CEO of Ascend Airways said "We are excited to commence operations for TUI Airways. We are extremely grateful for the confidence that they have shown in Ascend Airways and we

are proud to have TUI Airways as our launch customer. We will be fully focused on repaying the faith TUI" "This is a landmark day for the company," says commercial director Tony Carder. "We are ready for a busy summer with our damp-lease operations

Aurigny has been forced to lease two new ATR 72-600 aircraft, following a drop in reliability to below the UK average The airline, which is owned by the States of Guernsey, had previously been one of the UK's most punctual airlines but a recent run of "technical" events has seen the airlines cancellations and delays increase. Aurigny is in the process of changing to an all propeller fleet after deciding toditch its Embraer E195 jetand has an optimistic network in place which is putting a stretch on its fleet meaning that technical issues such as unscheduled maintenance or failures can have a significant knock-on effect

Ryanair have announced their annual profits for year 2022-2023, reached €1.92bn, beating the previous record of €1.45bn in 2017-18. Record numbers of passengers helped offset a fuel bill which rose around a third to €5.1bn.Ryanair carried a record 183.7 million passengers over the year to March, with average fares up 21 per cent to €49.80 (£42.60). It said it had seen record trading last summer, and strong traffic over Easter in March. Ryanair said ticket price increases are easing and it was "cautiously optimistic" that summer peak fares may only be "modestly ahead" of last year. The carrier said it expects fares to be "flat to modestly higher" despite the post-pandemic boom in demand for travel continuing and seat capacity limited. Michael O'Leary, Ryanair chief executive suggested that a "recessionary feel around Europe" could be a factor in ticket prices easing. The airline. Europe's largest by passenger numbers, said it would be 23 jets short of the number Boeingwas due to deliver by the end of July and there remained an "unlikely risk" deliveries could slip further. "It is a bit surprising that pricing hasn't been stronger and we're not quite sure whether that's just consumer sentiment or recessionary feel around Europe, but we still see peak travel demand certainly through July and August being strong," he told investors. Delays in new Boeing aircraft deliveries and a lack of spare parts has limited capacity in Europe, something airline executives expected would result in further fare increases during another busy summer. Mr O'Leary said Ryanair will receive "modest" compensation from Boeingfor the delays but that the confidential amount does not reflect the quantum of losses suffered from having to cut the number of passengers it forecast it would carry to the end of March 2025 to 198 million – 200 million passengers down from 205 million. The airline saidAmber Rudd, the former Conservative Home Secretary, would join its board as a non-executive director.

AIRCRAFT NEWS

Boeing marked a significant milestone by delivering its 1,500th 737 MAX aircraft to Ryanair, a budget carrier. The aircraft, a 737 MAX 8-200, was part of an order for one hundred units placed in 2014, with options for another hundred. This delivery comes seven years after the world's first 737 MAX flight for Lion Air. Despite production challenges stemming from past accidents, Boeing has steadily increased deliveries, albeit with inconsistencies. Ryanair, now operating 94 MAX 8-200s out of a fleet of 590 aircraft, has also ordered 150 MAX 10s.

Fokker Next Gen announced, on the 13th May, it has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with airBaltic. In the agreement, both companies will work together in developing a clean-sheet hydrogen powered narrowbody aircraft. Fokker will use the insights and experience as a regional airline, while airBaltic will use the agreement to investigate how the aircraft can work in its network.Fokker Next Gen is the successor of Rekkof, owned by Panta Holdings. Previously, the company had been working on a revival of the Fokker-jetline but is now working on designing a new 120-150 seat narrowbody aircraft powered by liquid hydrogen combustion, able to fly up to 2,500 km. Next to hydrogen, the new aircraft will also feature a dual fuel tank system so that it can also fly on sustainable aviation fuel or kerosene when liquid hydrogen is unavailable. The manufacturer is currently busy with designing its new aircraft but

also convert a Fokker 100 into a testbed for flying on liquid hydrogen. The company is working together with Rolls-Royce on this under the EU Clean Aviation program. The conversion and development will take a while, with first flight planned for 2028. In 2030, Fokker Next Gen aims to finalize the design of its new aircraft and start production of the first components. Two years later, assembly of the prototype is planned with a first flight a year later, in 2033. The aim is to secure entry into commercial service with customers in 2035. Fokker Next Gen has given an architect the assignment to design its new manufacturing sites, which are now planned to be located in Groningen, the Netherlands, and Liepaja, Latvia.

The newest Spirit AeroSystems whistleblower has dismissed conspiracy theories about two other whistleblowers who died shortly after coming forward with claims of safety issues at Boeing suppliers, but admitted he's remaining vigilant about his own safety. Santiago Paredes, 40, exclusively spoke to The Independentiust before he attended the celebration of life for his former coworker, friend and fellow whistleblower Joshua Dean, who died 30 April at the age of 45 afterbattling a sudden illness. Dean's death came weeks afteranother Boeing whistblower. John Barnett, died by suicide in March. When asked about wildfire rumours regarding whether something nefarious happened to the men after speaking out, Paredes said: "I don't think so. "But, you know, I'm always looking behind my mirror to make sure nobody's car's following me," he said. "I'm not saving that I'm scared, but at the same time. I can't put a blind eve to the reality of what could be. I have to prepare myself for that." Paredes spent more than a decade as an inspector and team leader at Boeing supplier Spirit AeroSystems before leaving in 2022 after repeatedly issuing warnings to superiors about quality control failings - which at one point resulted in his demotion, he says. Spirit AeroSystems — not to be confused with Spirit Airlines - manufactures plane components, including fuselages and wing parts, and Boeing is its largest customer.
