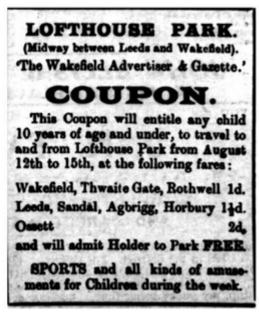
Lofthouse Park Aerodrome....Steve Langfield

LOFTHOUSE PARK AERODROME, WAKEFIELD 1908 - 1914

Lofthouse Park was a private estate and the Electric Tramway Company decided to open an amusement park there in 1908 by leasing 60 acres of land, it was the first of its kind in the country, the Lightwater Valley of its day. It was officially opened on 3rd June 1908 and lies between Leeds and Wakefield. The Park drew on Wakefield and Leeds for its visitors who were transported there mainly by tramway. There were many attractions available to the visiting public - bands, dancing, singing, sports, skating, treasure hunts and firework displays. In the early years there was no regular flying but when Harold Blackburn based his monoplane there from March 1913 daily flying was advertised in local newspapers - weather permitting. By 1913 the site was being referred to as the 'Yorkshire Aerodrome'.

On 12th November 1909 The Leeds Mercury announced a "flying week" at the Park for British Aviators commencing on 15th November. Flights were intended to be daily. Both monoplanes and biplanes had been entered, but in the event there were only two entries on the day, Alex Craig of Liverpool and EC Mines of West Kirby. On 16th November "Whilst attempting to work the propeller" on his monoplane during the morning, Alex Craig had the misfortune to have the third finger on his left hand smashed by kick back from the engine. Later in the day his coentrant E Mines succeeded in getting his biplane going along the drive of the Park, but just as he was getting up to speed it collided with a post. The two back wheels were buckled and the tyre of right wheel was torn off. The pilot was unhurt and with the aid of a sympathetic crowd the damaged aircraft was taken back to the Aerodrome for repairs.

The following year on Monday 1st August 1910 a holiday crowd of some 15k people assembled at the Park. George Barnes was the main attraction, and he managed some very successful flights in his Humber Monoplane (looking very much like a Bleriot machine) though he did declare the landing field to be very rough ground. His first 3 flights were about ¼ mile each and for the last flight of the day he flew a good three quarters of the distance round the park enclosure. The performance was greeted with loud cheering and applause by the large crowd. There was also a balloon ascent to entertain the crowds. There was a short piece in the Wakefield Herald stating that owing to bad weather Mr George Barnes had been unable to make his intended flights the previous week. To make up for this he had been engaged to fly on the coming weekend, 5th and 6th August. The weather again interfered with Barnes's flying demonstrations at Lofthouse Park. His aeroplane was not brought out of its shed at any time so strong was the wind. A small crowd of 200 visited the Park but it was obvious there would be no flying.

The Bradford Daily Telegraph issued on 9th February 1911 reported "Airman Arrives, Flies in a Mist". Harold Blackburn was expected to land at The Bierley Lane, Bradford, Aerodrome from Lofthouse shortly after 10am. He had been expected a few days previously but was prevented by winds. His arrival today had been delayed by mist at Lofthouse though otherwise conditions were considered perfect. Before noon a slight breeze sprang up and the mist was dissipated. But after noon the mist thickened again, nevertheless Harold Blackburn took off from Lofthouse at 12.45pm and was accompanied by the Leeds Lord Mayoress's sister, Miss Pauline Clough. After circling the Park two or three times they set off for Bierley Lane Aerodrome, east of Bradford, and they were soon lost to sight in the heavy mist. When they arrived over Bradford there was also a mist but finally Blackburn managed to land at 2.25pm for what should have been a flight lasting a mere 12 minutes.

In 1911 ownership of the Park changed hands. Things then seem to have gone guiet until there was a brief report in Flight magazine in their issue of 31st August 1912 when it was reported that famed aviator Bentfield Hucks had given demonstration flights at Lofthouse Park. In the First World War Hucks would become known for his method of providing initial power to start up a piston engine, it was an auxiliary power unit almost always mounted on a truck and called the Hucks Starter. The following year was much busier, mainly due to the activities of Harold Blackburn. The Leeds Mercury edition of 26th March 1913 reported that Harold Blackburn was again the main attraction at Lofthouse Park when he gave flying exhibitions. His first flight that day was made at about 3pm and after circling around the buildings he climbed to 800ft in spite of a strong wind. A Blackburn Monoplane was purchased by Cyril Foggin and in his first few days of ownership he had made 18 short flights. Harold Blackburn made frequent trips to the Stray at Harrogate, one such was made on 22nd April 1913 when the weather conditions were ideal with scarcely a breeze stirring. He 'mounted' his monoplane at Lofthouse Park shortly after 1.30pm and disappeared in the direction of Leeds flying over Hunslet at 60mph and 1500ft. His aircraft was flying beautifully. The appearance of his machine caused considerable excitement in the neighbourhood, he then turned and flying very steadily passed over Pepper Road in the direction of Harrogate. Arriving at the Stray after a flight of just 18 minutes he told the crowds after landing that it was his intention to leave on the return journey at 5pm. According to The Sheffield Daily Telegraph on 24th April 1913 Harold Blackburn had a 'thrilling escape' when on a return flight from Harrogate to Lofthouse. He had just started back on the return journey when, after a guarter of a mile the machine was seen to make a turn to the left. The crowds 'consternation was great' when the aeroplane 'gave a tilt' and then crashed nose first to the ground. There was relief when the only injury the pilot suffered was a cut nose.

The Yorkshire Post on 13th May 1913 reported that between 2 to 3 thousand people, mainly from Leeds and Wakefield, spent an afternoon at Lofthouse Park attracted largely by the prospect of flying taking place. Although it was warm and mostly sunny it was not until early evening that the aviators on the ground, Harold Blackburn and Cyril Foggin, were able to prepare a machine ready for flight. This was a Blackburn Monoplane, a new Type D which had been built over the previous fortnight to the order of Cyril Foggin, this aeroplane is still airworthy and is based at Shuttleworths, Old Warden. Shortly after 6pm Harold Blackburn made a graceful ascent rising to a height of over 1000ft 'and then making several fine circles'. There was rain in the air and a tricky wind prevailed but the aviator had his machine under perfect control and landed after a short flight of just 6 minutes. As usual the spectators warmly cheered the achievement.

At this time flying was still very much a novelty and newspapers were keen to report on any aircraft flight. The Leeds Mercury reported on 17th May 1913 that Harold Blackburn 'made 2 splendid flights yesterday'. The first departure was a short 9 minute flight from Lofthouse over Wakefield and in the afternoon he left Lofthouse Park at 4.30pm to fly over Normanton and Castleford for a 10 minute flight. In the Wakefield Herald of 24th May there was an article concerning the sale of lots at Lofthouse Park. In the meantime the Park carried on trading, on 22nd May Cyril Foggin, who a few days previously had purchased a new Blackburn Monoplane Type D, was making flights from Lofthouse Park. He then intended to fly his machine to Newcastle where it would be based and whilst conditions were far from favourable with very strong winds he took off from the Park. He then wisely decided rather than pressing on against the winds that he would land back but the ground was soft, the wheels sank into the ground, his aeroplane did a somersault and while Foggin ended up with his newly purchased Monoplane on top of him he was unhurt.

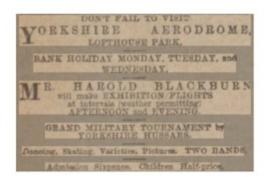


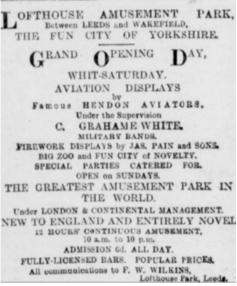
The Blackburn Monoplane Type D purchased by Cyril Foggin is kept airworthy today by the Shuttleworth Trust, Old Warden.

Harold Blackburn was by now more active at the Park and on 31 May 1913 he continued to give 'fine flights at the Yorkshire Aerodrome'. He gave an exhibition of figure 8's, circles and banked turns, remaining over Wakefield for 15 minutes or so. On his return to the Park he gave several pleasure flights taking a passenger weighing 14 stone to a height of 2000ft. From June 1913 the Park advertised that daily flights would take place - weather permitting July of 1913 was particularly busy with Harold Blackburn at the centre of activity. As a trial he was asked to make three flights to York on consecutive days carrying 'buff' copies of the late edition of the Yorkshire Evening Post, his first flight was made on 23rd July. His start was delayed by half an hour until 5.10pm due to strong winds and he took off within 300yds, he was determined not to disappoint the crowd at the Park. An encouraging shout went up from the assembled large crowd and in the next moment he was seen to be battling against a terrific head wind which was estimated to be blowing directly into the Monoplane at around 30 mph. It's true to say that Harold Blackburn didn't wish to disappoint the crowd and took risks he should not have taken on the flight. He landed on the Knavesmire (the site of York Racecourse) at 6.16pm, a trip of 65 minutes. The newspapers were immediately distributed, there was great demand for souvenirs of the flight.

Blackburn's second flight to York was made the following day, 24th July. Through the afternoon the sightseers gathered at Lofthouse Park and it was estimated the crowd was 30,000 strong. Due to the previous day's bad weather Blackburn had returned with his aeroplane by rail and from 2pm onwards together with his mechanics they were busy fitting the aeroplane together. An hour before the scheduled departure time there was hardly any wind. At 16.35 Blackburn brought his machine to the starting point and at 16.43 the bundles of the Buff Yorkshire Evening Post were stowed away in the fuselage. The engine was started and the aviator gave the signal for his men to let go. He ran along the ground for a few hundred yards and then, amidst loud cheers, rose gracefully into the air. All the way along the Wakefield Road from Lofthouse Park to Stourton a long line of people stood, hoping to catch a glance of the aviator as he sped to York. The crowd gathered at the Knavesmire was also estimated at 30,000 and their great cheers showed how Blackburn had won their respect with his 'plucky flight' the previous evening and by his speedy trip today. He landed at 5.22pm after circling the ground. The Yorkshire Evening Posts were unloaded after a flight of 37 minutes and he was inundated with congratulations. Then, on 25th July 1913, Harold Blackburn wound up his series of flights to York with a third trip, again carrying copies of the Buff Yorkshire Evening Post. This time flying conditions were ideal as he took off from Lofthouse Park and landed at the Knavesmire 35 minutes later to be greeted again by a large enthusiastic crowd.

Lofthouse Park was widely advertised in the local press. The top example dates back to 6/8/10, then the advert on the left appeared on 5/8/13 and to the right this appeared on 22/5/14. The Park was placed into Receivership on 16/7/14

Back to more mundane flying trips Blackburn flew to Harrogate Stray on 16th August, leaving the Park at 7pm. He took with him as a passenger Grahame Christie, a Doctor of Engineering. He left his return flight as late as possible to wait for better weather but in the event he had to return to Lofthouse the following day. Even pioneer pilots are entitled to a holiday break and Harold Blackburn left Lofthouse on 22nd August to fly to Harrogate, he would fly onto Bridlington on the east coast where he would spend a few days. The next we hear of Blackburn's exploits was on 9th February 1914 with a short piece in the Yorkshire Evening Post when he departed Lofthouse Park at noon heading to the Bierley Lane Aerodrome, Bradford which he had been to previously. On this occasion his passenger once again was Miss Pauline Clough, sister of the Lady Mayoress of Leeds, and the purpose of this trip was to carry a letter from the Lady Mayoress of Leeds to the Lady Mayoress of Bradford. The trip was originally scheduled for Saturday 7th but it was cancelled due to adverse weather. He was back in the local newspapers again on 9th April when he flew to Sheffield. He departed the Park at 6.30pm with a Mrs Hartley Bacon as a passenger and he arrived at his destination, a distance of 30 miles, 17 minutes later.

A front page advertisement in the Halifax Guardian editions of 22nd and 23rd of May 1914 announced 'Grand Opening Day Lofthouse Amusement Park'. 'Whit Saturday Aviation Displays by Famous Hendon Aviators Under the Supervision of Claude Grahame-White. The Greatest Amusement Park in the World'. But, Lofthouse Park had been struggling financially for several years and on 16th July 1914 the bubble burst when receivers were appointed, and then the Company owning the Park went into liquidation as mortgagees. Perhaps the

Park had been ahead of its time and the cost of travel and entry for the working man would have been prohibitive. In any event the First World War would have put paid to the Park and the area was soon converted to hold German and Italian prisoners of war. Today there are no reminders of the Park, the area has been built over.

Yorknite 24....

After around 10 days of very gloomy weather with lots of low thick cloud the weather forecast for Monday 11th November was for a mild day with plenty of sunshine. This was the day that the Swiss Air Force were due to arrive at RAF Leeming for the annual Yorknite exercise.

A search through the Internet and Facebook for information revealed that first arrival was expected to be a Helvetic Airways Embraer E190 at 0950 followed later by the Hornets, with the first one expected at 11.15am

The weather forecast was correct and I awoke to a clear bright mild sunny day so I quickly made some sandwiches, loaded the ladder into the car and headed off to RAF Leeming, I arrived around 0930 and managed to get a good spot in the viewing area which was already very busy. Approaching the airfield there were plenty of people armed with cameras and big lenses occupying various vantage spots by the airfield.

There was already plenty of action in the circuit from the based Hawks and Grobs with a couple of Hawk two ships departing as I arrived.

I soon heard that the Embraer was in the descent and it arrived at 0950 as expected. It was followed not long after by a Swiss Air Force Pilatus PC-12 Eagle which hadn't been expected and was a nice surprise. The Hornets had been spotted on Flight Rader24 and bang on 1115 the first two arrived, flying down the runway centreline and then braking right to land on runway 34. A total of 10 Hornets, 8 single seat and 2 twin seat arrived in total, all in pairs at around 15 minute intervals which gave plenty of time for photographs as they taxied in before the next two arrived. All made for the HAS shelters on the North side and disappeared from view.

If you fancy a trip up to Leeming Yorknite is held annually for 4 weeks each November and they usually do a number of sorties each day the first one being around 1430 hours. There is no flying on a weekend and the airfield viewing area will give you an excellent view but doesn't offer any facilities but these can be found nearby on the A1.

Commercial news....

LEEDS/BRADFORD NEWS

Easyjet announced their Winter 2025/2026 programme as we close for press. The published routes, exactly mirrors the summer schedule, (and Geneva winter timetable) so could very well be subject to change. However for the record, Belfast International 4 times weekly, Paris, Palma and Malaga twice weekly, and Geneva once weekly.

Ryanair have made a few slight increases in flight schedules for February and March. Alicante increases from 8 to 10 flights a week, Malaga from 6 to 7, Krakow from 7 to 8 and Gdansk from 3 to 4. Some of these flights are using the Marrakech allocated aircraft, following the withdrawal of that destination by Ryanair from most U.K. airports.

AIRPORT NEWS

Heathrow airport is set to announce a multibillion-pound investment as it prepares its proposal for a new runway. In a speech, chief executive Thomas Woldbye unveiled funding for upgrades and expansion, such as boosting the capacity of Terminals 2 and 5, reconfiguring the layout of the airfield, and boosting bus and coach. It comes after Chancellor Rachel Reeves used a speech on growth last month to give her support for a third runway at Heathrow. Mr Woldbye is expected to say: "This privately-funded programme will upgrade existing infrastructure while laying the groundwork for a third runway, boosting UK investment and economic growth, with tangible benefits felt this year. "Heathrow is proud to answer the Chancellor's call to get Britain building." The Government said the investment programme is expected to secure thousands of British steel jobs across the country by driving a significant increase in demand for UK-made steel. Mr Woldbye will add: "A third runway is critical for the country's future economic success, and I confirm we will submit our plans for a third runway to Government this summer.

"Ahead of then, as part of a phased expansion programme and supported by the Government's clear backing, I am confirming multibillion-pound investment plans, 100% privately-funded, to upgrade our terminal buildings, enhance passenger experience, and improve resilience and sustainability. The airport said during January, it recorded the busiest January in its history. More than 6.3 million passengers travelled through its four terminals, that is up more than 5% from six million in January 2024. The airport said transatlantic travel was a "key contributor" to the growth More than 1.2 million passengers travelled between Heathrow and the US in January, up 8% compared with a year earlier.

London Cityairport has applied for permission to allow Airbus A320neo aircraft to use its runway. The airport said the proposal made to regulator the Civil Aviation Authoritywould allow it to reach its permitted limit for passenger numbers with fewer flights. It would also increase the number of routes served, London City added. The Government approved London City's plan to increase its annual passenger cap from 6.5 million to nine million by 2031. It would broaden the range of leisure destinations for our passengers, enable growth without increasing the number of flight movements, deliver much-needed economic growth and accelerate re-fleeting to cleaner, quieter, new-generation aircraft Sais Alison FitzGerald, of London City. This was on the basis of no rise in the limit on the number of flights, and no new infrastructure. London City's application seeks permission to reduce the angle of approaching flights, which would be necessary for it to safely accommodate the A320neo.

Stansted Airport owners Manchester Airports Group have announced a major investment package.. This will involve a £600 million extension to the passenger terminal, including extra seating areas and more shops, restaurants and bars. Extending the terminal rather than building another one means that Stansted will still be a single-terminal airport, which its owners believe is a point in its favour in terms of simplicity of travel. The security hall is also due to be enlarged, with additional check-in desks and new baggage reclaim carousels, and the airfield taxiway is to be upgraded. With an eye to sustainability, a new 14.3-megawatt solar farm will be constructed on site to manage Stansted's increasing electricity requirements. The airport already has a biomass boiler and holds a Carbon Trust Standard, and was awarded Level 3+ carbon neutral status by the Airports Council International. Once the development is completed, the annual passenger total is expected to be 43 million passengers per year, meaning Stansted would overtake Gatwick at 41 million and become the UK's second busiest airport after Heathrow. To those in the know this is unsurprising, as Stansted has broken its record for passenger numbers every month during 2024. On Friday 23rd August over 103,000 passengers passed through Stansted, a record for that month believed to have been boosted by legions of fans flying home from Taylor Swift's concerts, which had taken place at nearby Wembley Stadium earlier that week. The government believes that the new expansion will double the airport's yearly economic contribution to the UK to £2 billion. As a bonus, it's hoped that around 5,000 new jobs will be created as a result of the investment.

AIRLINE NEWS

British Airways, are going back to operating turbo props, schedules have indicated that the airline will swap the Airbus A.320 for Aerospatiale ATR 72 aircraft on flights between London-Gatwick and Glasgow. The published flight time will increase from 90 minutes to 120 minutes when the change comes into effect on March 30th. The aircraft will be wet leased Emerald Airlines.

ITA Airways has announced plans to revive the iconic Alitalia brand by the end of 2024, incorporating the tagline "inspired by Alitalia" at key touchpoints and eventually featuring it on the livery of its fleet. The move aims to enhance the legacy of Alitalia while maintaining ITA Airways' distinct identity. Chairman Antonino Turicchi emphasised that this strategy will reinforce the airline's values of excellence in air transport. This announcement follows ITA Airways' acquisition by the Lufthansa Group and coincides with the release of its 2024 half-year financial results. The airline reported €1.4 billion in revenue, a €300 million increase over 2023, with an EBITDA of €62 million. ITA Airways also saw a 26% rise in passenger numbers, carrying 8.3 million passengers with an improved load factor of 79%.

Ryanair's finance chief has said Rachel Reeves should cut taxes rather thanback Heathrow expansionif she wants to boost the economy. Neil Sorahan said scrapping aplanned increase in airline passenger taxwould do far more to encourage short-term growth than building a new runway at Heathrow. Mr Sorahan said halting the increase in the departure tax would boost passenger numbers and bolster the argument for investment in airports. By contrast, capital-spending projects such asbuilding a new runway at Heathrowwould "take forever" to yield results. Planned increases in air passenger duty (APD) announced in the Budget meanRyanair is cutting UK flightsjust as the Chancellor seeks to stimulate the economy. Mr Sorahan said: "It's a strange message to be sending out, that 'costs are going up but we're going to put more runways in place'. "If they really want growth in the short term the easiest thing they can do is reduce APD. That will bring more flights into the UK that will back up their case for more runway capacity."

Wizz Airwill launch the UK's only non-stop flights to the Saudi Arabiancity of Medinalater this vear. From August 1, the budget airline will operate daily return flights between Gatwick and Medina – a holy city in the Islamic faith – using a new Airbus A321XLR aircraft. The enhanced fuel capacity of the Airbus A321XLRs means they will have a maximum range of up to 11 hours' flying time and burn up to 30 per cent less fuel per seat than previous generation aircraft, according to Airbus. Wizz Air will also use the type to fly between Gatwick and Jeddah. Saudi Arabia, from March 31, which will be the airline's longest UK route. Wizz Air already has an extensive network in the Middle East, with nearly 100 routes across the region. Marion Geoffroy, managing director of Wizz Air UK, said the announcement of the Gatwick-Medina route is "an important milestone for the airline, as we continue to widen our network from the UK beyond Europe". Flights will last up to nearly seven hours, with seats that do not recline. Ms Geoffroy told the PA news agency: "The ultra low-cost seat has evolved over time. "The comfort is the same (as other airlines' economy seats)." She said she was recently on an Emirates flight and found she "didn't have more space" compared with a Wizz Air plane. Ms Geoffroy added: "It's down to also how you feel on board. "We have an improved cabin with a different light. "It's also down to how the cabin crew make you feel when you're on board. "It's a matter of really looking at the fares because (between) economy on Emirates and economy on Wizz, I think there is not so much difference nowadays when it comes to the seat comfort."

AIRCRAFT NEWS

Boom Supersonic, the company building the world's fastest airliner, Overture, announced the successful first supersonic flight of its XB-1 demonstrator aircraft at the Mojave Air & Space Port in California, during late January. Boom designed, built, and flew the world's first independently developed supersonic jet—the first civil supersonic jet made in America. by Boom Chief Test Pilot Tristan "Geppetto" Brandenburg, XB-1 entered the supersonic corridor and reached an altitude of 35,290 feet before accelerating to Mach 1.122 (652 KTAS or 750 mph) – breaking the sound barrier for the first time. Historically, supersonic aircraft have been the work of nation states, developed by militaries and governments, XB-1's supersonic flight marks the first time an independently developed jet has broken the sound barrier. "XB-1's supersonic flight demonstrates that the technology for passenger supersonic flight has arrived," said Boom Supersonic founder and CEO Blake Scholl. "A small band of talented and dedicated engineers has accomplished what previously took governments and billions of dollars. Next, we are scaling up the technology on XB-1 for the Overture supersonic airliner. Our ultimate goal is to bring the benefits of supersonic flight to everyone." The first supersonic jet built from airliner technology, XB-1 incorporates many of the key features found on Overture, such as carbon fibre composites, digital stability augmentation, and an augmented reality vision system for landing visibility. Following its inaugural flight in March 2024, XB-1 completed a rigorous series of 11 human-piloted test flights under increasingly challenging conditions to evaluate systems and aerodynamics. Over the course of the flight test campaign, the XB-1 team systematically expanded the flight envelope through subsonic, transonic, and supersonic speeds—while taking smart risks and maintaining safety as top priority.

OTHER NEWS

The Council of the European Union adopted a 16th package of sanctions against Russia on the third anniversary of its full-scale invasion of Ukraine, tightening already existing restrictions against the Russian aviation industry and adding new bans on dealings with selected airports. Simultaneously, the United Kingdom added new entities and individuals to its sanctions list.

Among the measures adopted on February 24, 2024, the member states of the EU agreed to prohibit any airline operating domestic flights within Russia from flying to, from, or over the European Union. So far, this ban only applied to Russian air carriers but has now been extended to cover all operators. Russia recently signalled itswillingness to open the domestic market to foreign airlinesto offset sanctions-caused aircraft shortages in the country. The amended Council decision 2014/512/CFSP also sanctions all international companies that provide aircraft or other sanctioned goods to airlines operating domestic flights in Russia. Meanwhile, Council Regulation (EU) 2025/395 designates six airports - Moscow Vnukovo, Zhukovsky, Perm Bolshoye Savino, Ekaterinburg, Nizhnekamsk, and Pskov-due to their allegedly outsized role as military bases and staging points for the transfer of weapons and military vehicles. This means that EU-based companies will not be able to enter into any transactions with the operators of these six airports. Until now, airport operators were not designated by the EU. EU ministers also added Vadim Badekha, CEO of UAC United Aircraft Corporation, to their list of designated individuals. It is the first time the head of Russia's stateowned aircraft manufacturing holding was sanctioned. In turn, the UK government addedS7 Airlinesand its founder Vladislay Filey to its own list of sanctions. The airline has thus far not been under specific sanctions anywhere outside Ukraine, although it is covered by the EU's industry-wide designation. The United States Office of Foreign Affairs Control (OFAC) previously designated S7's MRO subsidiary. S7 Technics. Australia and New Zealand also imposed their own sanctions, but these did not include any aviation industry companies or executives.

Icelandic tour guide Alexander Valur Wium Brynjólfsson and his French fiancée, Kita, took their love to new heights—getting married aboard Play Airlines flight OG400 en route from Keflavik to Paris CDG. Unable to choose between Iceland or France for their wedding, they opted for a ceremony in the skies between the two countries, onboard Airbus A.321neo registered TF-PLC. Passengers were delighted as the aisle became a church floor, with a priest in full regalia leading the bride to the groom. The couple exchanged vows to their chosen songs, followed by an onboard celebration.

Service with BMA was on lease from Finnair initially in the late '70s and again in the mid '80s. Wfu in 1997 and scrapped in 2003. British Midland had its roots in Derby Airways and was eventually absorbed into IAG
